

Policy & Clarifications

Important Policy Update - Speech-Language Pathology - Clinical Fellowship Status

The Department of Public Health is providing guidance and clarity to the December 5, 2016 policy memo regarding the required documentation for Speech Language Pathology - Clinical Fellows to become provisionally certified in the MA EI system. As noted in the policy memo, individuals in their CF must be classified as a Developmental Specialist (DS) in the EI Certification system, from the time of hire until the time of completion of the CF, and receipt of a Massachusetts SLP license. DPH will waive the DSd 6% ratio for clinicians currently in their CF until the fellowship is completed for up to a year. The Clinical Fellow will need to submit the following documentation to be hired as a DS(d):

• Transcript and evidence that the Speech Language Pathology Licensure candidate is currently in their Clinical Fellowship year by submitting a copy of the Supervised Professional Practice Plan.

If the individual would like to be provisionally certified as a DS (a-c), the following documentation is required:

Transcripts of degree work or subsequent transcripts that reflect successful completion of at least 4 approved 3credit courses that focus on infants, toddlers, and/or families. Additionally, at least 300 hours of practicum or work
experience with young children (under the age of 5) is required and documented on a résumé. Additional experience with infants, toddlers, and/or families is preferred.

Once the permanent Speech Language Pathology license is issued, the Program Director will need to submit a tracking form with a copy of the license. The date of hire remains the same. The staff will then be reclassified in the DPH personnel database as an SLP.

The Department is aware of the challenges programs are facing in hiring a qualified, diverse staff to meet the needs of children and families enrolled in programs. In response to that challenge, we have allowed the opportunity for staff to be provisionally certified as Developmental Specialists while continuing to meet the highest level of qualifications for individual disciplines. The Department is also aware of the recommendations from the ICC Standards committee to revise the language for the Speech Language Pathology – Clinical Fellow, and will have further discussions after the recommendations have been presented to the ICC Steering Committee in May.



Data Manager Updates



New EIIS Client Application Upgrade

DPH, and more specifically, Linda Mosesso, would like to THANK all of the EI program directors and EIIS data support personnel for the FABULOUS job they did assisting in downloading and installing the new EIIS application version. Everything went extremely smoothly and all 60 EI programs were upgraded with the new EIIS in 12 days. New EIIS Client Application Upgrade, Part II

One addition to EIIS that was not stated in any other previous correspondence was an update that occurred in all of the text fields. There are certain characters or keystrokes (e.g., hitting the Enter key in order to create a new paragraph) that cause problems in your database. Therefore, the following will happen when, for example, the EIIS person is entering information under the "Reason for Referral" question:

- A comma will change to a colon
- A double quote will change to a single quote
- Hitting the Enter key will not create a new line

Please pass this information along to your EIIS support person so that their data entry in the many EIIS text fields will go smoothly. And again, THANK YOU all!

Specialty Services Updates

Home Modification Loan

At a recent Autism Commission Meeting, a presentation was made by Susan Gillam, Project Manager for the Home Modification Loan Program (HMLP).

The HMLP, a program of the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission, was established by the Massachusetts Legislature to assist homeowners and small landlords to fund the necessary changes to keep disabled or elderly family members in their own homes and communities.

For example, the program has funded ramps and lifts, kitchen and bathroom modifications, hand rails, brighter lighting, the widening of doorways, and floor renovations. These simple modifications can be the difference between keeping a

disabled or elderly family member at home as opposed to relocating the individual to a long-term health care facility. Homeowners who are income-eligible may borrow up to \$30,000 (inclusive of all costs) in a no or low-interest deferred payment or amortized loan.

The HMLP is not limited to assisting individuals with physical disabilities, but broadly covers the needs of individuals with Autism, such as building a sensory room in a home or fencing in the back yard for safety.
