DPH Updates

FY19 IFSP Outcome Data Collection

This fall Regional Specialists will be going out to EI programs to collect IFSP outcomes as part of the evaluation for our State's Systemic Improvement Plan (SSIP). The SSIP is a federally required (Indicator 11) state designed, multi-year quality improvement plan. Massachusetts has chosen improving children's social-emotional outcomes as their quality improvement area to focus on.

IFSP outcomes will be collected from 10 files, from IFSPs developed during the 7/1/2018 through 12/31/2018 time frame using the new IFSP form. Files will be selected randomly; a mix of both initial and annual IFSP's, and no more than 3 outcomes per file, will be collected. The outcomes will then be rated based on the 6 criteria of a high quality participation based outcome. Programs will receive a report on the results by February 2018.

For our federal SSIP submission, we will be using the combined statewide data to evaluate the effectiveness of the state's effort in implementing and supporting the practices that were presented in Embedding the Key Principles into the IFSP Process and now in Foundations of MA EI, Part 1.

Specialty Services Update

SSP Autism Survey

Thank you very much to all the EI Program Directors, staff, and SSP Autism Program Directors for completing the surveys sent out at the end of July. The summer posed challenges to getting surveys returned in a timely manner, but overall the response was excellent and provided enough information to analyze data both statewide and regionally. With that said, it has taken longer than expected to sort through the data from 60 EIPs and 15 SSPs. A summary and recommendations compiled as a full report will be shared with the field in the near future. Until that time, DPH will continue to monitor capacity for SSP Autism services in Early Intervention programs.

Born This Way Presents: Deaf Out Loud

I'm sure many of you are familiar with the A&E TV series, "Born This Way," that follows a group of young adults with Down Syndrome and their families as they navigate adulthood and the issues of independent living, working, and friendships. If you haven't seen this series, it is something you may want to check out!

On September 12, 2018, a new production, Deaf Out Loud, first aired.

"Executive produced by Academy® Award-winner Marlee Matlin, this new documentary special follows three predominantly deaf families as they raise their children in a hearing world. With many differing opinions about how deaf children should be raised swirling in the social consciousness, these families work to forge their own paths forward and combat the daily social stigmas many deaf people face."

This show differs from the Down Syndrome series as it highlights families with young children, with both hearing and deaf parents, with hearing and deaf siblings. The topic of this first episode focused on the options families have regarding ASL and Cochlear Implants and Inclusion to name a few. The important message is that families have choices and decisions are not made easily.
